## **OVER 15 YEARS OF MESSY CHURCH**



It's a Saturday afternoon and St John's church is full of noise and activity. It's loud, it's joyous ... and it's messy. If you've ever passed by and wondered what's happening, this is Messy Church. A church for people of all ages to come together to do crafts, play games, tell

stories from the Bible and

explore themes around faith and everyday life.

The Messy Church movement began in the Diocese of Portsmouth in 2004. The idea was to create a form of worship that would interest local families. One of the original team members was Lucy Moore, who went on to develop Messy Church with BRF (the Bible Reading Fellowship) and promote it worldwide as church based on creativity, hospitality and celebration.

Our Messy Church at St John's started more than 15 years ago. Revd Margaret Blake, the then Rector, and Revd Margaret Dean, Curate, introduced the new style of service and formed a team to plan, prepare and run the services.

Today, our Messy Church family continues to meet on the second

Saturday of alternate months. The team arrange a number of craft activities suitable for all ages, each connected in some way to our Bible story or theme. The crafts change each time, although we always include a bright collage







and a challenge where teams compete for the most points!

Following the crafts, James leads us in some prayers, a song and a short talk and then we all sit down for tea and cake.

Great fun and very popular.

# From the Rectory



Some readers may remember the Boulting Brothers film from 1951, The Man In The White Suit, in which Alec Guinness plays an inventor who manages to make a fabric that never gets dirty and never wears out. This seems like a marvellous boon to society until everyone (apart from the inventor) realises the implication: once everyone has bought their everlasting clothes, nobody will want any more and the whole textile industry will collapse. I thought of this the other day as my hedge trimmer stopped working in the middle of tackling the huge laurel bushes in the Rectory garden. The fault seems to lie with the battery: not only can you not get spares, but the manufacturer no longer seems to make the tool. It might be that I have to buy an entire new and different one, just because its battery doesn't work. This seems hugely wasteful, but it's the way a great deal of the economy functions, at least at the moment. The time will surely come when we will have to generate more economic activity through recovering reusable materials from what we make, rather than just junking them and making new stuff; but for the moment built-in obsolescence is the model we have.

What would the world be like if nothing broke or wore out – if you bought a consumer item once, and it lasted the rest of your life, and

only when it was improved would you have any motivation to buy a replacement? Things would be fundamentally and massively different: a great deal of economic activity would simply not happen.

Yet this is the kind of world we're invited to imagine when we think about the Kingdom of God – as it says in the Book of Revelation, a state of things like a city made of crystal where there isn't even any need for a sun or moon because the light of God illuminates it. How the hedges will be trimmed and the lawns maintained is a minor matter by comparison – and even to ask the question sounds absurd, because the whole situation is so utterly outside our experience that we can't envisage it in anything other than pictures and symbols.

The turning of the year brings with it the suggestion of renewal in perhaps small but potentially significant ways, through the resolutions and promises we might make. Here in this earthly realm everything needs continual renewal, and this is how we experience our spiritual lives as well as being one of the motors of our economic life. The time will come when it will be different in ways we can't conceive, but for now, notwithstanding the frustrations, it may be for the good that the everlasting fabric remains just a fantasy!

# The Three Masses of Christmas

Ghost stories are traditional at Christmas and a little while ago I shared with a friend one of my favourites - more comic than spooky, this one comes from Provence and tells the tale of the 17th-century Fr Balaguere who is tempted by the Devil, disguised as an altar server, to rush through his three Christmas masses so he and the parish can get to their Christmas feast quicker. They are all then condemned to reappear every Christmas night until the skippedthrough mass has been done properly three hundred times. I realised that although I knew about the tradition of saying three communion services at Christmas I wasn't clear where it came from, so I checked, although I'm not completely sure about the history of the observance even now. Some sources say the tradition of the three masses began with a night-time service at the Grotto of the Nativity in Bethlehem, followed by a dawn service at the Church of the Resurrection in Jerusalem and then the usual daytime liturgy. This then spread to Rome possibly in the 8th century when the church of St Mary Major acquired some pieces of sycamore wood that were supposed to be parts of the manger where Jesus had been placed. The Pope would celebrate mass there at midnight, and then at dawn would do the same at the church of St Anastasia, a martyr whose feast day is December 25th (rather a shame for her, that, a bit like having your birthday on Christmas Day) and whose name means 'resurrection'. Finally he would celebrate the main mass of the day at St Peter's. Gradually this pattern spread over Europe and each of the three services developed its own texts and themes. There are question marks over a number of elements in this explanation, but it seems to make most sense of what we know.

Until the end of the 19th century Anglican churches did on Christmas Day whatever they would do on a normal Sunday, but then some of the most Catholic-minded churches adopted the pattern of the three services, beginning with the Midnight Mass, and followed by an early morning and a mid-morning service on Christmas Day. In fact, as time wore on, in many churches there would be considerably more than three Christmas services just to fit in all the people who might want to make their communion: numbers could run into several hundreds even at a relatively small church like Farncombe. Eventually the Church of England officially recognised the idea of the three services by providing three different sets of Bible readings to go with each.

The tendency recently has been for churches to drop one or more of the threefold Christmas services because of declining attendance and the difficulty of finding clergy to celebrate them or people to help with them. Even at Farncombe, where we do keep the traditional pattern, we've had to recognise that we won't be able to gather together a choir for the Midnight Mass or the main morning service on Christmas Day, and will have to choose which of those gets an organist rather than John Preston ably assisting the singing on the piano. But that does mean that each service acquires a slightly different character rather than all being the same. And there is plenty of time to avoid the sin of Fr Balaquere, and celebrate all the masses properly!

# BIG GROUP SING SELL-OUT CHRISTMAS CONCERT



We still have a selection of shops which cover many of our daily needs and there are charity shops and also the food bank, a fairly recent addition run by volunteers and supplied by contributions from residents and shops. There are also a number of groups at the church which help in specific ways, such as the hearing aid clinic, and the Day Centre provides various forms of care, entertainment and meals during the week which are available at advertised rates. There are many volunteer groups around who need more help to achieve their objectives and would be pleased to have more members.

We also have the Community Garden at Broadwater and the Farncombe Initiative, which provide a variety of activities and encourage us to work together with others for the benefit of the whole community. If you look along platform 2 at the station, you will see that the border by the fence has been upgraded and springtime should be very colourful. This is just part of their plans to improve the station and



other areas. Many residents find that the traffic in Farncombe is quite a problem, especially as we have 2 level crossings (and quite a lot of trains!) Walking into the village is a good way to avoid the parking problem although not possible for some people but it is a good idea to walk as much as possible – it is good exercise and it enables us to maintain contacts and friendships with others. Why not make a resolution to walk to the shops as much as possible, have a chat with a friend, perhaps even treat yourself to coffee, and try to help each other.

#### LGBTQ+History Month Reflecting on Icons and Finding Support

Catalyst Support is a local charity supporting the mental health and wellbeing of adults living in Surrey. The charity offers a free LGBTQ+ listening service for those who wish to talk about their own or others' sexuality or gender identity. Known as Outline, this service is available for confidential conversations via call, text or email on



Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings between 7pm and 9pm. February is LGBTQ+ History month, and Outline reflects on some significant historic figures from the LGBTQ+ community:


• Octavia Hill (1838-1912) was a campaigner for social reform and emphasised the importance of open space for all, coining the term 'green belt' and co-founding the National Trust. Surrey's Hydons Ball and Heath were one of the National Trust's earliest acquisitions, and the area is now a memorial to Hill. It is understood that Hill had

several relationships with women including Sophia Jex-Blake, one of the first female doctors. She is now buried with her partner of 30 years, Harriet Yorke, in Kent.

• Ivor Cummings (1913-1992) was a senior official in the welfare department of the Colonial Office and worked as an advocate for the rights of African and Caribbean settlers, before and throughout he

initial Windrush scandal. Cummings was known to go above and beyond to support people in finding employment and housing. Cummings was born in England to an English mother and Sierra Leonean father. He was open about being gay, despite homosexuality being a crime at the time.

 Annie Kenney (1879-1953) was a leading suffragette of working-class background, campaigning for the rights of women to vote in Britain.



According to diaries kept by peers, it is accepted that Kenney had several romantic relationships with women, including Emmeline Pankhurst's daughter Christabel.

## hristmas at St.John's 2024



## BROADWATER PARKRUN

Parkrun is a series of volunteer run, weekly, 5km timed runs around the world. In the UK they take place at 9am. Parkrun is open to everyone and it is safe and easy to take part. People of every ability are supported. Our Broadwater regulars range from babies in buggies to octogenarians; some complete the 5k in well under 20 mins, and some over an hour. All are welcome!



## WINTER GARDENING

Happy New Year to all our gardeners, a new start always reminds us that we continue to learn more about growing and caring for plants, especially with the challenges of climate change and what seems to be more variation in the growth of plants from year to year. We need to keep a closer check on how our plants are growing – I was pruning some brambles in December after a very productive season and was astonished to find several tasty fruits ready for a crumble! The following suggestions are based on traditional timings but you may find that your particular conditions mean that some changes can give better results.

**Vegetables** Digging over the soil and putting on compost as a preparation for sowing seed is a good start (and also helps to work off any over-indulgence in the festive season!) Peas and broad beans can be sown for early crops but are best kept covered in case of frost damage to new shoots. An alternative is to sow the seed in pots or trays and wait until the seedlings are well developed before planting out. If you have a suitably sheltered site it is possible to grow early cabbage and chard too.

Fruit This is the time to plant new trees so make sure the site is well dug in with good compost. Check existing bushes such as currants and gooseberries and cut back overlapping shoots to allow a good circulation of air when the leaves have grown. Blackcurrant cuttings can be taken but make sure they are kept in a frost-free area to allow them to begin growth.

**Flower beds** It is useful to have a plan of what flowers you want to grow so that seeds can be sown and plants bought as required – it is very tempting to impulse buy in the garden centres but



although seedlings may look small then, check how big they can grow so that other plants are not adversely affected.

**Preparation** Whilst tools are not in regular use it is important to check over and clean your machinery and hand tools and sharpen cutting tools.





## The Farncombe Initiative

- Four main areas of activity: Advocacy connecting with local councils to seek the best for Farncombe
  - Public Art and Heritage enhancing and celebrating our village
  - Railway Station taking action for its upkeep and improvement
  - Gardening including tree planting and litter picking



The Farncombe Initiative generally looks forward to seeing how our daily lives and surroundings can be improved, whether by the installation of street benches or by pushing authorities to fill in those wretched potholes.

Occasionally, however, it is good to pause and look back on those who have contributed to making Farncombe what it is today.

One of the longest standing of these is Ray Brown.

Ray is R I Brown, barbers, of 28A St John's Street. Ray is not just the proprietor of the business; he is the business. The address, 28A is a giveaway; this old school-barber's shop is annexed to the nextdoor building.

Ray has been here cutting the hair of the men (and boys) of Farncombe for over 50 years and this is his story as told to us by his

wife, Jenny.



Ray and Jenny were both born and brought up on Farncombe. He was born in October 1948 and lived with his parents in 24 Tottenham Road, backing on to the railway line. He first attended Miss Hussey's school at 1 Lower Manor Road with his friend Keith Wilde, then Farncombe Church of England Primary School (now the Farncombe Day Centre) and finally Meadrow County Secondary School, which today is the site of Godalming Junior School.

Ray left school in 1960 and would have liked to have gone to work on the railway. However, one day his father was at the St John's Street barbers next to A. L. Patrick the news agents and Jim Stafford the barber mentioned that he was looking for an apprentice. That was it! In those days if your father found you a job, you took it. It was a busy little business and Ray worked for Jim until 1982, when he retired, and Ray took over the shop. It was a very traditional men's barber's and there was certainly no hairdressing

for women. On a Saturday, the busiest day of the week, even schoolboys were not allowed. Although other hairdressing salons opened in the area, Ray retained his loyal customers, many of whom would bring him railway books and magazines and have sent him cards during his recent period of ill-health, which has been much appreciated.



In the meantime, Ray met Jenny who lived with her family in Broadwater Lane. Jenny worked as a Saturday girl in the newsagents from where men could walk straight through into the barber's after buying their paper and cigarettes. They got married in St John's Church, close to his work, and where their children were christened. Ray is very much a family man and he and Jenny have three children, (Claire, Chris and Richard) seven grandchildren and a great-granddaughter. Their home is full of photos of their family.

Throughout his life Ray has maintained his interest in all things railways, perhaps dating back to living in Tottenham Road, when steam drawn trains ran behind his house. He is an avid collector of railway books and also of model trains, with an enviable model railway set up. Holidays were usually the occasion for railway photography and he has a vast collection of photos taken by him, including many of steam locos passing through Farncombe.

His other great interest is wildlife. His and Jenny's back garden in the appropriately named Squirrel's Close is a haven for hedgehogs, all sorts of birdlife and, of course, squirrels. He wrote regularly for the local bird society and carried out bird counts at Broadwater Lake for the British Ornithological Society.

Ray has been obliged by ill-health to hang up his clippers finally after over half a century of cutting the hair of the men of Farncombe. After a spell in hospital his family is waiting to welcome Ray back

At the heart of our vision as a church family, and represented in the brick design of the new Church Centre, are two historic events that


turned the world upside down, and that are transforming lives the world over today with peace and hope. Jesus' death, is represented by a cross

## Protect Yourself from Scams

As more people continue to work from home and rely heavily on the Internet, there has been a noticeable rise in Internet-related scams. Cybercriminals are taking advantage of our dependence on technology and the frustrations many experience with their Internet connections.

A particularly common scam involves individuals posing as representatives from BT Openreach or similar Internet providers. This scam often begins with a phone call claiming that the caller has detected problems with your Internet connection or that your connection speed is slower than what you're paying for. For those who have recently reported issues to their Internet provider, this can appear genuine.

Unfortunately, it is nothing more than a sophisticated scam. The goal of these scammers is to gain remote access to your computer or mobile device. They might ask you to:

Provide personal information. Visit a specific webpage or download software that allows them to control your device remotely. Share your credit card or bank details to "resolve" the issue.

How to Stay Safe

 Do Not Share Personal Information: Never provide sensitive details over the phone, especially if the call is unsolicited.

- Avoid Remote Access Requests: Do not download any software or allow someone to guide you to a specific webpage unless you have verified their legitimacy.
- Never Share Financial Information: Legitimate service providers will not ask for your credit card or banking details during troubleshooting.
- Hang Up: If you receive a suspicious call, simply put the phone down. Legitimate companies rarely resolve issues through unsolicited calls.
- If you do fall victim to such a scam, act quickly:
- Contact Your Bank: Notify your bank immediately to secure your accounts.
- Seek IT Support: Take your computer or device to a trusted local IT support company to check for malicious software or unauthorized access.
- Staying vigilant is the key to avoiding these scams. Remember, no genuine Internet provider will ask for remote access to your device or financial details over an unsolicited phone call. Be cautious and stay safe.
